The meeting mostly followed the sequence of items on the attached agenda; the minutes are organized by agenda item.

**1. Welcome**

Elsa Rodrigues, Chair, opens the meeting by welcoming those in attendance.

**2. Minutes of the General Assembly in London**

Elsa presents the minutes of the 2017 GA; those present vote and approve the minutes.

**3. Report of the Chair**

Elsa presents the report, which has been distributed and is attached to these minutes. Since she closely follows the written report, the content is not reported in these minutes. The report covers the following:

#### **4. Report of the Treasurer / Approval of the 2019 Budget**

Frank Louhenapessy, Treasurer, reports that we don't have a budget to present or approve, primarily because there are still too many uncertainties around the Kyoto conference in Sep 2019. For example, transportation and translators are still unknowns. Gianluca Kannes comments on the translator issue in Milan, that they had to use conference translators, which were much more expensive. Elsa and Yoshihiro respond that this is not an issue because ICOM Kyoto does not provide translators. By the end of November there will be a clearer picture of the Kyoto expenses. Frank says these costs will be clear before the end of November.

Frank reports on the seven projects that are being funded at 500 euro each for a total of 3,500 euros, and he briefly mentions the other expenses that go into the 2019 budget. Frank states that the bank account of DEMHIST is solid.

Frank reports on how payments are being made as of this year, based on new policy provided by ICOM Paris. Basically, we only pay our contributions after completion of a project.

Remko asks about the budget approval process: since the budget is not ready, how will it be approved, which would usually be first by the board and then by the general assembly? Can we do this via email? Elsa and Frank state this will be done by email. Frank further explains that he will first present the budget to the board for approval, then it goes to the members. That will be at the end of November. Yvonne asks whether this goes to all members, or only to the members present. The general conclusion is that it will go to the general membership.

#### **5. Conferences**

##### **a. Feedback on the 2018 Baku conference**

- Walaa El Din Badawy first comments on the benefits of attending this conference, seeing different house museums and different styles in another country.
- Mousruti Das also comments, expressing her thanks for the travel grant. She wants to share her Baku experience with her colleagues in India, to start something of a National Group. She will start contacting stakeholders in her state, then in Rajasthan. The Baku conference has inspired her to initiate this back home.

Frank asks how we can help. Mousruti states possibly through letters of reference or recommendation. She will keep us informed, through Elsa, on her activities.

- Anis Chaaya thanks the board for their confidence and expresses his appreciation of this being a joint conference - a success for both committees. He makes special mention and appreciation of the site visits to various house museums. This is a learning experience for all, including those countries who are paying less attention to house museums.
- Iris Broersma also expresses her appreciation for the joint character of the conference. Unfortunately not more DEMHIST members are in attendance. She wonders if there could be some brainstorming on how to change this. Yet, she's very glad that she joined the conference.
- Frank responds to the issue of there being few DEMHIST members, and how to improve this. He mentions the development of the new DEMHIST website. Iris responds that dissemination of information is important, suggesting that this needs to happen more throughout the year, including the website. Elsa states that it's not quite clear why not more members are in attendance. Gianluca thinks that for a DEMHIST conference it is important that it provides participants with opportunities to contact local curators - things that would not be as easily possible when visiting a city on your own. Gianluca makes the case for the *added value* of a conference, above a regular visit to a city.

## **5. Conferences**

### **b. Update on the 2019 conference in Kyoto**

Yoshihiro Nakatani gives an update on developments around the Kyoto conference. He reports on the various locations where activities will take place, including the conference center, university, Nijo-jo Castle, gardens, private house museums, and others. He also reports some on the plans of joint conferences with CAMOC, ICMS, and ICAMT.

## **6. DEMHIST Strategic Plan**

Elsa reports on the Strategic Plan of the previous board, which included:

- Organizing an annual conference
- Publishing papers
- Encouraging existing and new national groups
- Supporting events of interest to DEMHIST
- Training of young professional
- Starting DEMHIST social media platforms

Elsa then asks those present what the members are expecting from DEMHIST.

Anis brings up the issue of private, traditional, restored houses in the Middle East. He asks if included in the strategic plan, whether short term or long term, could be steps on how to help, to manage, or to encourage these small places to open to the public, to the benefit of the public as well as the owners of the house. This might increase the number of DEMHIST members in the region.

A discussion follows what steps can be taken; what outreach is possible to assist those in the region. Information about a variety of topics, on the website? A local workshop? As the discussion goes on, about houses that occasionally open as museums, while families still live there, the question may be: is there a change in the definition of house museums? Should this be addressed through the DEMHIST strategic plan? Is there a possibility to address the questions of such museums in the Middle East?

While there may be issues of organizing such a workshop on location in the Middle East, Anis points out the need for reaching out in one way or another, whether through a workshop or through the internet. The suggestion is made that the board work with Anis to reach out to contacts in the Middle East to gauge the level of interest.

## Annual Report of the Chair October 2017 – October 2018

This report covers the period between the annual conference in London, England, October 2017 to the present, a period of 12 months. It also reports you on future events and partnerships that DEMHIST has been established.

### 1. Conferences

#### Baku, Azerbaijan 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> October 2018 – Joint Conference ICDAD / DEMHIST *Decorative Arts and Interiors*

The 2018 annual conference is hosted by the Azerbaijan Carpet Museum and it is a collaboration between the ICOM's international committees ICDAD and DEMHIST with the support of ICOM and management of ICOM Azerbaijan and Ministry of Culture of the Republic of Azerbaijan as our local organisers. The theme is Decorative Arts and Interiors. Sub-themes within the conference will explore: Textiles in interiors; Interior design and defining identity; Interiors and authenticity; Metalwork and jewelry. There is a wide range of exciting international speakers to share their knowledge and experience on papers and in short talks. We are having the honour of the presence of the president of ICOM, Suay Aksoy, the president of ICOM-Europe, Luis Raposo, the president of ICOM Azerbaijan, Shirin Melikova and a representative of the Ministry of Culture of the Republic of Azerbaijan.

Besides that, there will be two keynote speakers: Sevil Sadikhova, Doctor in Arts and Anis Chaaya, PhD in Archaeology, ICOMOS-Lebanon Board Member and Associate Professor at Lebanese University.

#### Future conferences:

#### Kyoto, 1<sup>st</sup> – 9<sup>th</sup> September 2019 – Two-day DEMHIST conference and one-day joint-conference CAMOC/ DEMHIST

#### *Museums as hubs: The future of tradition*

Next year, we will be in Kyoto, Japan, as part of the next ICOM Triennial and we will be hearing from representatives of the event as part the Baku conference. Moreover, Yoshihiro Nakatani, DEMHIST Board Member, who is our local contact, is going to speak at the General Assembly.

As part of our networking priority we are going to have one-day joint conference with CAMOC (International Committee for the Collections and Activities of Museums of Cities). For the other three days a programme just focussed on DEMHIST has being planned.

However, DEMHIST has also recently been approached by ICAMT (International Committee for Architecture and Museum Techniques) to organise an off-site visit together and by ICMS (International Committee for Museum Security) to organise a half-day programme together. The format of these collaborations had been discussed last week in Kyoto by the Chairpersons of the three committees (DEMHIST, ICAMT and ICMS) and are now being discussed within its Boards. Te result of these developments will be announced soon.

### Multi-Party Session Kyoto 2019

ICOM-Netherlands, DEMHIST and the Affiliated Alliance EXARC (Archaeological Open-Air Museums and Experimental Archaeology) are organising a Multi-Party Session in Kyoto. The aim is to investigate the role of museums in international cultural relations, focusing on Dutch-Japanese historical ties and what they mean to the present time with perspectives of future developments.

## **2. Training Courses for professionals**

### Mexico City, 6<sup>th</sup>-17<sup>th</sup> November 2017

DEMHIST held its first international training course for professionals in Mexico City in Cooperation with ICOM-Mexico, ICOM and *Red de Casas Museo México*.

The training course was held in eight different host institutions, namely Museo Casa de Carranza, Museo Casa del Poeta Ramón López Velarde, Centro Cultural Isidro Fabela - Museo Casa del Risco, Recinto de Homenaje a Don Benito Juárez - Palacio Nacional, Museo Frida Kahlo, Museo Casa Estudio Diego Rivera y Frida Kahlo and Casa Luis Barragán. Besides that, alumni visited Museo Casa de la Bola, Casa Lamm, and the restoration workshops of Instituto Nacional de Belas Artes.

Between 20 and 45 participants attended each day, depending on the type of lesson format, a lecture or a workshop. Most participants were not ICOM members yet since they were still studying at the university or they were young professionals just with a couple of years of experience in the museum filed.

From the 20 registered participants 19 were Mexican and 1 was Colombian. In addition to that, the training course counted on 3 keynote speakers and 20 teachers (from DEMHIST, CECA and ICOM-CC).

The First International Training Course on House Museum was an excellent opportunity to Mexican young professionals to access specific subjects that usually are not covered at universities and they created their own network.

*Red Casas Museo México* became more solid than ever and therefore is now thinking about moving forward, organising other kind of activities. I was most grateful to the Mexican colleagues because in spite of the earthquake they haven't cancelled the training course and looked for alternative venues for the training course. DEMHIST also thanks all teachers who worked pro bono for this course. This is passion. This is dedication. This is lifelong commitment to the House Museums cause.

### **3. Partnerships**

#### International Symposium, Versailles, 29<sup>th</sup> November – 1<sup>st</sup> December 2017

DEMHIST was a partner of the International Symposium on Preventive Conservation in Historic Houses and Palace-Museums: Assessment Methodologies and Applications, that took place at Palace of Versailles, France. This event was Organised by the European Royal Residences Association (Réseau des Résidences Royales Européennes) in a cooperation project with DEMHIST, Chateau de Versailles - Centre de Recherche, Ministère de la Culture de France and EPICO (European Protocol in Preventive Conservation). DEMHIST members benefited from a special conference fee.

This international symposium concluded the 3-years EPICO programme aimed at a methodology to develop preventive conservation strategies for collections on display in historic houses or palace-museums.

The symposium was structured around three themes: Collections and risk evaluation: methodology and application; Moving from evaluation to planning: how to implement preventive conservation, led by historic-site professionals (presentations and round-table discussions); Science applied to preventive conservation of collections in situ: an essential aid for diagnostic purposes and conservation actions.

French and English simultaneous translation was provided. Fortyseven contributors presented papers and two of them were DEMHIST members: Iris Broersma, from The Netherlands and Francesca Baldry, from Italy. Two hundred participants represented many locations as well as major knowledge institutions and heritage agencies, mainly European or from the Americas.

European Royal Residences Association is now preparing the proceedings.



#### Public Programme, Chicago, 15<sup>th</sup> October 2018

Taking place at the Arts Club of Chicago, a public programme will feature four unique and geographically diverse artists, all of whom have ties to Chicago, through the lens of their home lives.

Curators Hannah Higham, Lisa Stone, Debbie Komanski, and Ami Bouhassane come together to explore questions moderated by Valerie Balint of the Historic Artists' Homes & Studios consortium.

This public programme is organised by the American Association of State and Local History in partnership with DEMHIST.

#### Historic House and Sites Summit, Miami, 4<sup>th</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup> February 2019

##### *Sustainability: Governance, Relevance and the Environment*

The second American Alliance of Museums Summit is co-organised by American Alliance of Museums Historic House & Sites Network, American Alliance of Museums Environment and Climate Network in collaboration with DEMHIST and it is hosted by Vizcaya Museums and Gardens, located in Miami.

The summit will focus on sustainability that affects decisions of the Historic House Museum professional.

#### **4. National DEMHIST Groups**

A key part of the DEMHIST strategy is to encourage and support national groups to provide more easily accessible activities that are relevant to members in those locations, and to increase membership. Our National Groups continue to grow in strength and we now have active groups in Italy, Portugal, Mexico, Brazil, Turkey and a new one is about to be created in Israel.

#### DEMHIST-Italy, Milan, 24<sup>th</sup> November 2017

##### *The voices of the house*

ICOM-Italy organised a round table at Fondazione Adolfo Pini. The main purpose was to promote an academic reflection about the object and their stories as well as about secondary daily stories. It had twentytwo participants (seventeen attendees + five speakers), all ICOM members since the event was only open to DEMHIST Italian National Group members. Partner Institutions were ICOM-Italy, Facoltà di Scienze Politiche e Sociali dell'Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore di Milano and Fondazione Adolfo Pini.

DEM HIST Portugal, Funchal, 23<sup>rd</sup> -24<sup>th</sup> February 2018

*Hyperconnected museums: New approaches, new publics*

The 9<sup>th</sup> meeting on House Museums in Portugal was hosted by Casa-Museu Frederico de Freitas, in Funchal (Madeira) and promoted a reflexion on the means of communication we have now at our disposal. They are increasing. It is a fact. Local and global connections are made and opportunities for museum are complex and unlimited. However, not all connections are digital.

The meetings combined lectures and visits to house museums and it had a huge impact on local news since newspapers and television covered the event.

DEM HIST\_Portugal accounted with the financial support of *Secretaria Regional do Turismo e Cultura da Região Autónoma da Madeira, Direcção Regional da Cultura da Madeira*, ICOM – Portugal and *Instituto Italiano de Cultura de Lisboa*.

Third Meeting on Literary House Museums, São Paulo, 13<sup>th</sup> -14<sup>th</sup> July 2018

“City & Accessibility”

The two-day meeting was organised by São Paulo Literary House Museums Net, in São Paulo, Brazil, 13<sup>th</sup> – 14<sup>th</sup> July. The meeting was coordinated by Casa Guilherme de Almeida that is a DEM HIST Institutional member. The theme focused on accessibility in institutions located in different size urban areas. Speakers came from different Brazilian states.

DEM HIST-Brazil, Rio de Janeiro, 13<sup>th</sup> August 2018

*House Museums: building, collection and characters*

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Brazilian Meeting on House Museums was held in Rio de Janeiro at Museu Casa de Rui Barbosa. It proposed a reflection on classic perception of House Museums, which keeps physical and symbolic records, but it is in constant change due to visitors’ influences, narratives and interpretations.

Ana Cristina Carvalho, coordinator of ICOM-Brazil, gave a speech at the opening ceremony.

DEM HIST-Italy, Lastra a Signa, 19<sup>th</sup> November 2018

*Bathrooms and hygiene in house museums: objects, spaces and habits*

This symposium focused on bathrooms and hygiene. The first session is taking place at Lastra a Signa (Florence region) on the 19<sup>th</sup> November 2018.

The aim is to discuss and explore renovation and recovery of historical bathroom facilities as well as on interpretation and on how to communicate those private spaces. The programme combines visits to Florentine House Museums that have their historical bathrooms open to the public.

DEMHIST-Brazil, São Paulo, November 2018

*Historic house museums and private collections: approaches, a dialogue of collections, considering typologies, conservation and extraversion challenges*

Brazilian and international experts are going to be in charge of the lectures of this two-day meeting, taking place in São Paulo, where eighty attendees are expected to participate. Material produced during the meeting will be available on Artistic-Cultural Collection of the Palaces of the Government of the State of São Paulo's website.

Under the main theme, Historic house museums and private collections, there will be three subthemes: I. Utilitarian and artistic collections: rethinking the usufruct, conservation and extraversion; II. Art collections: from the personal taste to the validation of criticism; III. Featured Collections: Sharing protagonism with the house and character.

DEMHIST-Mexico, Mexico City, November 2018

Mexican National group is organising a symposium in Mexico City in November 2018. This symposium is going to be video recorded and photographed to disseminate knowledge. About sixty attendees are expected to attend this national event.

DEMHIST-Israel, Tel-Aviv, December 2018

Timna Seligman is about to set the Israeli National group. A workshop is being planned for December. About fifteen participants from the whole country are expected to attend this event.

DEMHIST-Italy, Milan, 15<sup>th</sup> March 2109

*Bathrooms and hygiene in house museums: objects, spaces and habits*

A second session on the theme *Bathrooms and hygiene in house museums: objects, spaces and habits* is taking place at Vila Necchi Campiglio (Milan) on the 15<sup>th</sup> March 2019 with a similar format to the previous session.

DEMHIST-Portugal / ICOM-Europe, Guimarães, 2<sup>th</sup> – 4<sup>th</sup> May 2019

*Museums as hubs: The future of tradition*

*Interpreting, programming, innovating Memorial spaces in museological contexts*

In 2019 DEMHIST Portuguese national group celebrates 10 years delivering annual national meetings. For that reason, is now organising a special event, a three-day meeting, at the Ducal Palace of Guimarães, that is a joint meeting with ICOM-Europe, Ducal Palace of Guimarães and Regional Directorate for Culture – North of Portugal with the support of Guimarães and Vila Nova de Famalicão municipalities. European DEMHIST members

are welcome to attend this meeting since the aim is exactly to extend a national meeting to a much broader audience. The call for papers can be found at ICOM-Europe website: <http://network.icom.museum/europe/activities/conferences/>

DEMHIST-Portugal is also working on a publication revealing a reflexion on the themes covered on the previous nine meetings. The goal is not to publish the proceedings but to approach a contemporary and critical overview on the debated subjects.

I would like to remind all members that the annual conferences do not need to be the only events held by DEMHIST. National working groups can propose and organise conferences, seminars and meetings on themes of their choice within their own country or regionally. Such events can cover subjects of particular relevance to a region, and be more practical in terms of travel and cost. The DEMHIST Board has agreed some simple guidance about events that qualify as DEMHIST activities and can therefore be affiliated to the international committee and to ICOM. A small grant is available to support some of these events at the discretion of the Board.

To fulfil this aim DEMHIST Board agreed on granting some affiliated events in 2018 and in 2019. Applications forms were sent out in July. We already selected the grants for the 2018 affiliated events and we are about to select those for 2019.

## **5. The Jeanne Watson bursary for young professionals**

Honouring Jeanne Watson's memory and will, DEMHIST granted Walaa eldin Badawy Madbwly Ali, from Cairo, Egypt, with a bursary. He is the General Director of the Prince Mohammed Ali Palace (Manial Palace) and a he is PhD candidate in Museology. My thanks to past DEMHIST Chair, Daniela Ball for her assistance in managing this programme with Remko Jansonius and Yoshihiro Nakatani.

## **6. ICOM travel grant for young members**

For the first time International committees were directed to manage the ICOM travel grant for young members and to review the applications. DEMHIST is awarding the travel grant to Mousruti Das, from Kolkata, India. She will deliver a paper at the ICDAD-DEMHIST conference in Baku, this October. Mousruti, a PhD candidate in Museology, works at the Prasanta Chandra Memorial Museum and Archives.

## **7. Publications**

The proceedings of the Milan conference “House Museums and Interpretation of the Cultural, Social, Urban Landscape” are due next month.

The proceedings of London conference “Are we doing enough? Keeping heritage relevant in the 21st Century” are due next year.

## **8. Communications**

Our Twitter and Facebook accounts are now established. On Twitter we have 322 followers and on Facebook we have 502 followers. It pleases me to see that an increasing number of members is using these means of communication. Hillary Gugan-Walker is managing DEMHIST Social Media but Timna Seligman and Marta Antuñano are tweeting and posting as well.

The Relevance Twitter account made on purpose for the DEMHIST-CECA London conference had 417 followers and 791 Tweets.

## **9. The General Assembly 2018**

DEMHIST held its General Assembly at the Hampton Court Palace, in Hampton, on 16<sup>th</sup> October 2017. The minutes are included with the papers for the Baku General Assembly.

## **10. DEMHIST Board**

The DEMHIST Board has been facing issues and as a consequence the number of Board members has decreased from the initial 13 members that were elected in London, in October 2017.

The reasons for that are the following ones:

Jonathan Gration does not respond to the Board by any means of communication since the beginning of November.

Barbara Elfman resigned in March because she moved to other job position and works now in a University.

Ana Cristina Carvalho resigned in April because of health reasons; Ulla Stromberg volunteered to step in the position of Vice-Chair.

## 11. Secretary

The DEMHIST Vice-Chair and Secretary, Yvonne Ploum, was elected in October 2017. She said since the beginning that her position as Secretary was a temporary one until we find a replacement to this position.

Since her position was temporary, I maintained regular communications with members by sending out information and answering to those who emailed me. In June 2018 Remko Jansonius volunteered to be the Secretary and he now is taking charge of the duties of Secretary. However, just from mid-October he will be fully capable to communicate directly with members.

## 12. Treasurer

The DEMHIST Treasurer, Frank Louhenapessy, has prepared a separate report on his activities and the budget for 2019.

## 13. Chair

During the year I had the chance to promote DEMHIST in different contexts and environments:

My first official act as Chair was in Mexico City, on the 6<sup>th</sup> November 2017, at the opening ceremony of the 1<sup>st</sup> International Training Course for professionals. Then I gave two practical workshops, on the 9<sup>th</sup> November, to the alumni of that Training Course.

I gave an opening speech at the 9<sup>th</sup> Meeting on House Museums organised by DEMHIST-Portugal, in Funchal (Madeira). Media reported on the event through newspapers and television. I was interviewed by the television channel RTP Madeira twice: on the 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2018, for the local news and on the 24<sup>th</sup> February on the live show Atlântida. On both occasions, I spoke about DEMHIST and about Portuguese house museums.

On the 5<sup>th</sup> March 2018 I participated at *Jornadas da Primavera* promoted by ICOM-Portugal. I was invited, as Chair of DEMHIST, to be part of a round table on *Hyperconnected museums: What approaches and what publics?*

I was interviewed, as Chair of DEMHIST, on a radio live show on museums called *Museandoando*, in the Mexican National Radio Channel, Radio Formula, conducted by the journalist Veronica Muller, on the 28<sup>th</sup> April 2018. On that occasion I promoted DEMHIST and its activities in Mexico, at a national level.

From 1<sup>st</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> June 2018 I attended the Victorian Society in America Summer School in Newport, in the United States of America. There I talked about DEMHIST to my colleagues.

On the 11<sup>th</sup> June I gave a short talk about DEMHIST at the Tufts University, in Boston, to students of House Museums studies.

I have been to Japan recently attending the Maizuru Meeting, that took place on the 30<sup>th</sup> September and it was attended by Chairs of ICOM International Committees. The meeting was organised by ICOM-Japan and by ICOM Kyoto 2019 Organising Committee. On the very next day, 1<sup>st</sup> October, we visited the Kyoto conference venue. From 2<sup>nd</sup> – 4<sup>th</sup> October not only did I meet curators and directors of House Museums in Kyoto but also met Yoshihiro Nakatani to proceed with the preparation of DEMHIST conference in Kyoto in 2019.
